Letter to stakeholders

Tor Vergata University of Rome publishes an annual Sustainability Report, which accounts for the activities carried out and the results achieved in terms of social, environmental, and economic sustainability, as well as in the context of the three missions, in order to monitor the objectives and commitments it has made in the field of sustainable development. The seventh edition of the Sustainability Report, approved by the Board of Directors at the meeting of June 25, 2024, describes the path that the University, thanks to the full and active involvement of all the components of its Community, is taking to make Tor Vergata University of Rome an attentive, efficient, responsible, and sustainable institution. The data reported below refer to the 2023-2024 academic year and the 2023 calendar year.

The Sustainability Report represents:

- A communication tool for the University's commitment to sustainable development and the conviction of the assumption of this responsibility by the University's governing bodies towards all stakeholders;
- A document that summarizes, for public institutions, companies, citizens, non-profit associations, and internal stakeholders (students, professors, TAB staff), the efforts made and the results achieved from a perspective of sustainable development and innovation;
- The result of the application of the GRI Standard guidelines (Core Option) and the RUS-GBS "Sustainability Report of Universities" Standard and Implementation Manual, the first standard for reporting the sustainability reports of Italian universities (drafted by RUS, the Network of Universities for Sustainable Development, and GBS, the Sustainability and Reporting Group, January 2023 edition);
- Evidence of how the University contributes to achieving the 17 Sustainable Development Goals of the 2030 Agenda. Tor Vergata University of Rome, through the activities and projects it has implemented, is committed to pursuing the Sustainable Development Goals of the 2030 Agenda, the action program for people, the planet, and prosperity, defined by the UN in 2015;
- A bridge for listening to and receiving the demands of stakeholders.

Teaching and services offered to students and participants in first and second-level master's programs

Tor Vergata University of Rome sees students as the actual point of reference for teaching design and the management of its activities. For this reason, the University guarantees continuous improvement of the services offered. It ensures innovative and interdisciplinary educational paths aligned with sustainability themes, aiming to train responsible citizens prepared to face the professional world.

33.502 students enrolled in the 2023-2024 academic year 43% male and 57% female students, (+8,61% compared to the last biennium)

3,820 international students mainly from Asia and Europe enrolled in the 2023-2024 academic year

690 students participated in Erasmus+, Student Traineeship, and Over Seas mobility programs

5,436 graduates in 2023 (2,810 bachelor's, 2,105 master's, 521 single-cycle)

Dissemination and sharing of knowledge. Initiatives on the environment and collaboration with various social and economic actors

Tor Vergata University of Rome carries out numerous non-profit initiatives with educational, cultural and social development value to communicate and share the activities and benefits of higher education and research.



8 events organized within the 2023 Festival of Sustainable Development promoted by the Italian Alliance for Sustainable Development (ASviS)

70 participants in Climbing for Climate 5, an initiative to raise awareness on climate change, promoted by the RUS (Network of Universities for Sustainable Development) in collaboration with the CNR (National Research Council) and the CAI (Italian Alpine Club)

1 national event dedicated to social responsibility and sustainable development, the Salone della CSR e dell'Innovazione Sociale, with over 200 participants

994 students, from the 2014-2015 academic year, **participating in the New Economy Laboratories "Designing and Innovating Sustainably"** aimed at designing innovative and sustainable projects in response to the needs of the territory

1 "Elena Gianini Belotti" Anti-Violence Centre with the aim of protecting women, ensuring reception and protection, psychological assistance and support, a path out of violence, legal advice, and work support; in 2023, 117 women (86 external to the University, 31 internal) requested assistance

5 initiatives promoted by the CUG (Joint Committee for Equal Opportunities), aimed at disseminating knowledge and protecting equal opportunities and anti-discrimination policies

1 fir tree planted in the Rectorate Garden to fight gender-based violence and decorated, during the Christmas holidays, with **108** red-coloured hands in memory of every woman victim of violence in 2023

6 initiatives carried out at the Botanical Garden aimed at promoting the culture of environmental sustainability, biodiversity protection, land care, and promoting a culture of social integration

30 average users involved daily in green therapy workshops in collaboration with ASL Roma2, social cooperatives, foster homes, and day centers in the area

over 1,000 presences/users, including students and citizens, involved in laboratories and days dedicated to environmental education

Enhancing and engaging human resources

Working for Tor Vergata University of Rome means becoming part of an organisation where everyone can contribute to the achievement of common goals and to express their talent and professionalism. Human capital is the true strength and competitive advantage of the University for the high quality of three of its key areas: the services provided, teaching, and research.

2,351 employees working in various areas of the University, with a 2.6% increase compared to 2022



1,341 professors (490 women and 851 men)

1,010 managers and technical, administrative, and library staff (644 women and 366 men)

27% of total working hours performed in agile mode, used by 69% of female employees and 31% of male employees

+7% improvement in the Glass Ceiling Index (equal opportunities index) of the teaching staff compared to 2022



7,563 hours of professional training provided to technical, administrative, and library staff in foreign languages, IT, and interdisciplinary areas

510 participants in specialized training and professional development courses



100% of employees benefit from the health surveillance activity of the Tor Vergata University Polyclinic ("health path")

7 initiatives for the psycho-physical well-being of the staff with the provision of welfare assistance services, sports, cultural, and recreational services, such as insurance policy, Metrebus travel passes, reimbursement for nursery/childcare, etc.

University Gender Budget

Tor Vergata University of Rome promotes the affirmation of equal opportunities through measures to prevent and contrast gender-based violence. Since 2020, the University has been preparing the Gender Budget report, which identifies the University's strengths and areas for improvement in terms of gender equality so that these elements become an input for the planning of actions aimed at achieving specific gender equality objectives. Since 2021, the University has also published the Gender Equality Plan, a strategic document that defines the University's strategy to promote gender equality and equal opportunities within it.

Environmental respect and protection

Environmental protection, efficient resource management, and land care are priorities for Tor Vergata University of Rome.



100% renewable energy through the Guarantee of Origin (GO) issued by GSE

18,839 MWh total electricity consumption (-6.7% compared to 2022, also thanks to relamping activity in the Humanities and Engineering Macroareas)

93,727 $m^3\ total\ water\ consumption$ (-9% compared to the volumes of the last biennium)



3 projects* to improve the environmental sustainability of the Campus:

"SEDIA" project, to create outdoor rest and gathering spaces by installing solar charging modules with outdoor benches. Since 2021: 18 eco-sustainable educational and recreational stations present among the Faculties, Macroareas, and the Rectorate

"CARTA" project , of circular economy to raise awareness in the academic community on the recovery and reuse of paper: 8 paper collection bins installed in the campus spaces

"GOCCIA" project, to significantly reduce the use of single-use plastic within the University through the promotion of reusable bottles and the installation of 25 water dispensers in the Faculties and Macroareas



83 hectares of Botanical Garden available to the university community and the public, which hosts:

1 research centre active at the Botanical Garden for the conservation of germplasm with the aim of:

- preserving the genetic resources of tree, shrub, and herbaceous plant species native in the Lazio region, ensuring the survival of threatened species and protecting endemic species to conserve the local flora
- recovering and safeguarding ancient and modern cultivars that have economic importance (food, medicinal, etc.)

1 CO₂ garden for the reduction of greenhouse gas or climate-altering emissions, which in its current structure, at full capacity, will be able to absorb about 2 tons of CO₂ per year



1 photovoltaic system of 6 kW that, since November 2020, allows the University to produce electricity from renewable sources autonomously
